

Large Single Comb Rhode Island Reds for seven years now. Although Mark gives his opinion often, they are really mine. I have the final decision on who goes to the show. When we moved onto our 15 acre lot here in Memphis, MI, I wanted some chickens. Rhode Island Reds were my choice. After one year of raising the common production red, a good friend of ours, Doc Patterson, Sr. told me about Dennis Myers in Ohio.

So it began. Ordering 25 chicks from him to raise between me and several 4-H'ers. After the kids chose what they wanted, it left me with 17 cockerels! So back to Ohio for some pullets. Thank you Dennis for helping me out. I did well with those birds and built quite the flock. This past year I was told about another well know breeder. Mr. Don Nelson out of Rhode Island. He sold me some birds too. Now my flock is booming!! I won Best American several times and Grand Champion Large Fowl once!

We learned a lot over the seven years. They are a very hardy bird. The first years I housed my reds in a simple little beginner's coop. I could house 12 birds comfortably. As the flock grew, we had to look for more space. Mark bought a 12' x 14' building from near by farm. He insulated and installed a little heater. It's a beauty! The winter time is a challenge, but the made it. Placing clean shavings down constantly, over the existing manure pack, kept them warm. Clean freshwater and lots of food. The sheds are open vented at the top, and we used large metal panels from an old barn roof for doors. If it was sunny, we left the door open. When it got really cold, we shut them tight. I've also been fortunate enough to be able to rent a heated barn from Doc Patterson this past winter. Good thing, it was a real damp winter for us. Now we are building a 20' x 40' heated barn for our big Reds. There will be plenty of room now to expand that flock.


I enjoy the Rhode Island Red, and have met lots of nice people through showing them. I am looking forward to the big National this year and wish all of my competitors GOOD LUCK!

The good news is the Avian Influenza ban is finally over here and everywhere but VA and WV what I understand. Because of the AI we have not been able to show for several months now or have public sales of poultry (flea markets, farm stores, etc.). I personally did not get many large Reds hatched this year and the ones we did hatch will be too young for the fall shows. I credit this to the fact we used older males (large fowl and bantams) in the earlier colder weather. Fertility was late and apparently chick vitality was not what it should have been. I qualify this by comparing our fast, healthy hatches of large and bantams Rocks and Spanish which we used younger males. Of course the Red dilemma is disappointing because we certainly would like to be poised for the Columbus show and now will be very limited in show stock at that time. My older birds seem to always be moulting at that time also. I remember putting in a White Rock hen last year on Friday evening and by Sunday morning did good to find her in show cage full of feathers she had dropped. Page 7 The Red Club Chronicle

If any of you Tennessee Red breeders have a preference for your state meet, drop me an e-mail and I'll designate one. Our National Meet for 2002 will be the Florida Sunshine Classic in January. Actually what I would like to discuss is red type and their over all description. The Rhode Island Red is a

breed of bird like no other. We are looking for a brick body shape with legs, a head, and a tail protruding gracefully from this brick. This article is a precautionary article that is intended to open some breeders' eyes and make all of us stand up and take notice of what is happening. Too many judges out there are leading you astray. The Red is supposed to have a flat back. This is where I am beginning to see a great deal of fault. A number of breeders out there are not pay-

ing attention and they are producing a red feathered chicken with a carved or hunch back. There are several words for it but that is what it looks like. I am not sure if this is caused by the actual physical frame of the bird or if it is the result of the soft feathers on the bird. Yes. Soft feathers which tend to cup and raise away from the body. This is something that judges seem to prefer. I don't know why because the standard indicates that feathers over the back should be carried close to the body and this calls for a medium hard feather that sticks tight to the body avoiding fluffing up making the back appear carved. Think about this. If you have a medium feather that sticks to the body and your bird has a flat back you will not see that hunch back.

The next item I want to take issue with is size. The standard mentions weight as a limited factor. Many birds I handle anymore are in excess of the weight range allowed. Some are smaller. In large fowl we are looking for a bird that falls within the weight categories of: cock 8.5 pounds, cockerel 7.5 pounds, hen 6.5 pounds, and pullets 5.5 pounds with the exception of up to one pound over with no deduction. Bantams should be: cock 34 oz., cockerel 30 oz., hen 30 oz, and pullet 26 oz with a half point deduction for every ounce over. It is interesting that bantam hens are to be as heavy as cockerels but not large fowl. To let you in on something height has little to do with this. Frame is more important to shape and the weight of the bird. The length of the shank is what gives you height and that should be balanced with the bird. I recently exhibited a Large Red cockerel that was amazingly tall but he was not well enough finished to be of good type. The standard requires that the bird not be too fat or thin and weight must be proportional to size. My cockerel needs time to fill out and make his body fit his height. That will happen over time. What bothers me is that a large fowl must weight ten pounds for a judge to consider it good enough for champion row. And likewise the bantams seem to be getting pretty meaty as well. My birds are no exception to this but I am working on it. Beginners and those who have been doing this for years need to be sure and weigh their birds as cocks and hens to make sure

that they are good breeders and that they will produce young that will also fall within the weight range that is set. We need to encourage judges to make sure that they understand where our reds stand and remind them that they should be following the standard not what they want to see.

Until next time enjoy your reds and remember to vote. Votes must be post marked by November 25. Good luck to all candidates. Let's make this club one to be proud of.

prior Chronicle article who seem to have invented the Rhode Island Reds & Bantam. It is my pleasure to dispel this erroneous version of a few good old bucks carrying a ball that was already rolling well along without any help from a Mr. Johnson, Knickerbockers, and the rest of the lime lighters in other areas of US. Rhode Island reds are from New England enhanced by many but from New England, RI mass, North East Conn.

The Rhode Island Red bantam was not made in the south as some would leave it but was a Rhode Island Massachusetts animal that got swallowed up by a few entrepreneurs who saw a good thing.

I was born in Rhode Island in 1945 some time after the Rhode Island Red was adopted into Standard but not to late to see, hear and discuss Rhode Island reds with a few OLD Gentlemen. I have information from a Mr. Christopher Foster Browning of Perryville RI in the early 1960 that RI Reds were In RI, Conn & mass long before long before the APA and others were hot on their trail for recognition. Mr. Browning told me that from time to time and from year to year back in the 1900s folks from New York, Pennsylvania, and such would come to get his

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said. Mr. Browning told me they were not the dark Reds we have now but a sport or two would appear and he would use his darkest animals (Reds to Breed) Mr. Browning said that winters were long and taking good care of birds was a joy since no farming was done until the ground was able to be plowed. This is the same man although in his late 80s showed me how to cure Pork, bacon, and smoke them in old smoke house. Salt peter Salt and brown sugar was the mix rubbed on during a 2 week ordeal before smoking. He was a kind alert old man who new his apples and place in History. Nate Wright of Stonington Conn. whom I understand is still alive in nursing home showed me places where tar paper shacks and Stone built hen houses that were built out in pastures that behoove description this day surrounded by stone walls and pasyires these had once housed some of the best reds in South County, RI Tiverton, Fall River mass and Conn. South County is known to Don Nelson because he lives there I lived in Hope valley for awhile in 1960s and only native RI people of that area call it that south county, the State doesn't recognize that term as well as the Colonial Militias of Conn RI and Mass. Slaughter, massacre of the last of the Narragansett's Natives in 1619 as they slept in Great Swamp thinking they (Natives) would support King Philip, what a waste. The South County as well as Little Compton and Tiverton were exchanging RI. Red birds and it is my knowledge that the first RI Bantams were already made by the time the APA had Standards from that area. It was those birds that were sent to others around the US who enriched there color but not there spirit and general type as I saw no blind people raising old reds when I was young. I remember in Stonington Conn a very old friend of my mother who's husband 80s deceased had been a RI Red developer, I feel sad that because her husbands old RI Reds lacked the deep Rich color were not saved for documentation purposes. He had bred his reds for many, many years and may well have been one of few

darkest RI reds and off they would go he

Raw root stock left as Bantams that all of us share today .I was told by other breeders (Dick Gee) breeders that they were to light in color and that the darker Reds

were taking over, pity. Old timers like Nate Wright told me that people who were well off purchased many a Rhode Island Red and it is there efforts that take acclaim for our earlier pioneer friends who had long winters and insight to develop this type and colored birds. I remember a quote that Nate said "they had nothing better to do in winter". We today can only wonder all the past breeders whose small flocks and exchanges of birds developed with help of those in the know an APA jewel, the born & bred RHODE ISLAND RED. Got something better to do this winter? Raise Rhode Island Reds. The APA has an accurate record of happenings better than a few good ole boys today.

RHODE ISLAND REDS

HISTORY:

The origin of this breed dates back to a fowl bred in that section of New England which is located between Narragansett Bay and Buzzard's Bay. The name Rhode Island Red was given the breed in honor of the State where it originated from crossing the Red Malay Game, Leghorn and Asiatic native stock. In 1904, the single-comb variety was admitted to the American Standard of Perfection as a distinct breed of poultry.

The Rose-Comb Rhode Island Red was admitted to the Standard in 1905, although some breeders acclaim it to be the original variety. The earlier Rhode Island Reds sported both single and rose combs, some even having pea combs, due to their mixed ancestry and the fact of their being bred primarily for market purposes before they became a Standard breed. An important dual purpose breed, capable of excellent egg production; also very popular in our show rooms.

RHODE ISLAND WHITES

HISTORY

Rhode Island Whites were admitted to the Standard at Knoxville, Tennessee in 1922. They are said to have originated in Rhode Island from which state they take their name, and were first offered to the public in 1903, a result of crosses of Partridge Cochins, White Wyandottes and Rose-Comb White Leghorns.

The distinct shape characteristic of both Rhode Island Reds and Rhode Island Whites is the horizontal, oblong body. It is a fairly close-feathered fowl, the texture of the feathers being smooth and firm.

ECONOMIC QUALITIES:

Rhode Island Reds and Rhode Island Whites are general purpose fowls, bred for the production of meat and eggs. Color of skin, yellow; color of egg shells, brown to dark brown.

This February issue reminds us of the good book published for years called Red Hen Tales. The last one of these was pub-

lished in 1941. This issue is devoted to the show winnings made during the past show season, and we think it is a good idea. This year will be our 15th year with

R. I. Red Bantams, as we started to produce them in 1926, with a cross between Black Red Pit Game Bantams and Buff Cochins, then crossing onto S.C. and R. C. Rhode Island Red females. In 1940 we applied for admission to the Standard of Perfection for the S. C. Variety. This was all done by the R. I. Red Bantam Club of America. It is now 11 years since the original affidavits were made out and as we look at the names of the 15 men who signed their applications where L.A Hamilton, Walter C. Hobbs, D. W. Fancher, Frank A.Campbell, F.G. Crumbacher, John Acker, Oscar Winfield, Ezra L. Wolf, Kenneth V. Krider, E.Claire Lefingwell, George H. Gurtler, Harold E. Serviss, Rex Owens, S. H. Baker and myself. Real improvements has been made in our breed since their admission to the Standard and we have come a long way. May we advance as far in the next twenty -five years as we have in the past. Editors note: Mr. Johnson was considered by his peers in the 1960's as the father of Rhode Island Red Bantam and I have seen no other factual information to the contrary.

Boy this year has been going by fast for your President. I was supposed to have a total knee operation and replacement on my left knee just after returning back from the National Meet last November. My mother in law became ill and I had to cancel the operation so my wife moved up to North Mississippi to be near her

while she was in the hospital. The distance from our house is 300 miles so for about 16 weeks I would drive up there and back every weekend and be with them and return home on Sunday. Then I drive 80 miles round trip to work every day and the old car really has racked up some miles on it with all the traveling. My reds were just feed with a weeks supply of feed and dripping running water and they got along fine. I put the eggs in the incubator on Tuesdays and then I

could be home when the hatched. During the spring and summer, I would have to leave every weekend and as the young chicks that I hatched were placed in the free-range shelters they grew and feathered like I have never seen before. I had dog attacks, possums attack and for the first time in 13 years a raccoon came by to thin out my birds. Then this summer I had regular raids of hawks come in and, under the fit of the fittest principle, I still had twenty cockerels and twenty pullets left over to choose from for breeders this coming year. Things got even worse for us as my mother died in March and had to take care of her arrangements then my wife's mother in Mississippi died around the fourth of July. Both my mother and my wife's mother were 92 years old and lead great long lives. This was a trying time for both my wife and I. We sure had some testing periods not being together, trying to maintain the three acres, her 300 rose bushes, and the adult and baby Reds on the Free Range.

It is amazing during these stressful times how your friends come forward to help you out with your duties. In the Red Club I have my two Vice Presidents who came forward to support our club in so many ways as goodwill ambassadors to our breed. They wrote articles and reports in almost every issue of the Red Chronicle and I am so thankful for their support in helping us make your Red Chronicle worth wile reading ever two months. The Rhode Island Red Club has not seen such contributions from their Vice Presidents since the golden years of our club in the 1950s and 60s. Our District Directors came though with comments on what was going on in their districts for their members and wrote articles and this was greatly appreciated.

When I was down on my luck and needing help I could count on our good secretary Matt Lhamon to be there for me. I told him when he took over the club secretary position from Secretary Emmett Rachels that we need a nice Red Chronicle with some new snap to it. I told Matt I would attempt to motivate the members and officers to write some articles for him and see if he could put it together in a


